Athens, Wis. - Miltrim Farms

Conservation for generations – that's how David Trimner views environmental sustainability. David grew up on the farm, and in 2016 started his full-time career as a dairy farmer. Just as his family had done for him, David prioritizes being a steward of the land so that others can enjoy it for years to come. At Miltrim Farms, this doesn't just manifest itself in cover crops and no-till farming. David is most proud of his farm's commitment to water conservation and biodiversity that feeds into their sustainability efforts. Miltrim Farms ensures that in each season, there's a crop in place to help prevent soil erosion – and from alfalfa to plantains, they have some of the most robust crop biodiversity in Wisconsin, if not the nation. Their efforts to recycle rainwater, prevent soil erosion and runoff, and help combat surface water problems have earned Miltrim Farms a Clear Water Farm certification – the first farm in North America to earn the accolade.

Fond du Lac, Wis. - Abel Dairy

A passion for people: That's what drives Steve Abel of sixth-generation Abel Dairy. With a mindset of "we, not me," Steve and family constantly evaluate how they can leave a positive impact on those around them. Ask Steve what he's proudest of on the farm, and it's not an award or one of the accolades he's earned – it's how his family has touched generations of community members. Steve has been involved with the dairy farm his entire life and farmed at a nearby location until combining the farm with his father's dairy. Now, he's working to welcome the seventh generation into the farm. In 2008, Abel Dairy expanded, and as a result added a methane digester and renewable gas facility to ensure the longevity of the land for generations to come. Yet, Steve is proudest of the fact that every time someone on his team gets married, starts a family, or has an accomplishment, no matter the size, Steve knows that his family is helping to leave a lasting impact on their lives. Abel Dairy's story is a shining testament to how dairy families constantly work hard to serve those around them, from their families to their team members, to the land that they call home.

Now, she farms at her husband's third-generation farm. Annaliese is a mom, a dairy farmer, a connector, and the list doesn't end there – years later, she's working to inspire women on and off the farm to embrace the multifaceted roles that they take on in their lives. After working for a company selling skincare to try and connect with other rural women, Annaliese started her blog, Modern Day Farm Chick, to help bridge the gap between farm and table and allow consumers to truly get to know their farmers. Eleven years later, women across the nation, both on and off the farm, look to Modern Day Farm Chick for a source of connection. Annaliese's story is one that showcases the value of women on the farm and the roles they play, from mom to calf manager. Annaliese hopes to inspire other women to connect and show up as their authentic, multidimensional selves.

From herd monitoring devices to participating in research studies that benefit other farms, Wisconsin's dairy farmers are leading the way in animal care practices – not just for themselves, but for the industry as a whole. Wisconsin dairy farmers are passionate about maintaining topnotch animal care standards to ensure their animals are comfortable.

DeForest, Wis. - Blue Star Dairy

Sherri Meinholz has always loved animals. Growing up on her family's farm, she knew she wanted to pursue a career in animal wellness, so she worked as a veterinary technician for 10 years until coming back to a dairy career at Blue Star Dairy. As Sherri has grown up, and grown into different roles, so has herd health technology. At Blue Star Dairy, cows wear monitors that capture activity and record milk production data. There are also monitors that help provide insight into how their bodies work internally. The dairy team receives reports on herd health daily, allowing them to provide the best care possible for their cows. In the calf barn, calves receive lung screenings to detect respiratory illnesses before they start showing symptoms. Blue Star Dairy also partners with the UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine for studies and research, ensuring that animal care can move forward not just for their herd, but for everyone's. More than anything else, the team at Blue Star Dairy prides themselves on truly knowing their cows, from personality to name. Their story is one that highlights the care and passion dairy farmers and their teams constantly exercise over their herds, an extension of their own families.
